One of my favorite

days in the Church calendar year is January 6th--the day of "Epiphany." It's the story of the wise ones from the East--sometimes referred to as the "three kings"--following a brilliant star in the sky to the manger. You remember the story. They brought gifts to Jesus and paid him homage.

This story is so full of poetic and metaphoric imagery, and it is a powerful "statement" with profound political and cosmic implications. I'm going to preach more about it this coming Sunday, so I won't say too much here now.

Instead I just want to invite you to connect a few things in your minds and imaginations.

First, January 6th marked the one year anniversary of the insurrection in Washington, D.C. I was sobered and saddened as I watched the news this past Thursday and listened to people recount the events and experiences of that day. The loss of life, the traumatization, and all that the events of the day represent are a bit overwhelming to try to come to terms with. I am disturbed as I watch the forces and the "big lie" that fueled that insurrection continue to gain traction and dominate the political leadership (or lack thereof) that made that all possible. It is time to stop dancing around the simple truth that a large portion of our society is embracing a posture that is nothing short of fascist. These are dangerous times and they are getting more dangerous. We are going to need to find our voices and our collective voice as a congregation and come up with creative responses that reflect who we are as followers of Jesus. We will, and God will guide us.

Second, January 6th is also the day of Epiphany. For me, this has been the most meaningful Epiphany of my lifetime. Why? Because Epiphany is when we remind ourselves that the Light of God broke into human history, and the darkness will never overcome it. That's what our faith tells us. And it is when the darkness of the world is most overwhelming that we most need to look for the Light, and follow where it leads.

Third, I am strangely comforted and encouraged that the story includes how the wise ones from the East--the Star followers--were warned in a dream not to cooperate with a lying, manipulative, insecure king who was threatened to the point of being willing to sacrifice the lives of thousands of innocents--simply because he was told that someone else had been chosen to lead the people. Once again, as theologian Karl Barth once put it, "the Bible and the newspaper need to go hand in hand." (Karl would have to update that to include digital news, cable TV, and social media).

Brothers and sisters, let's look for the Light of Epiphany. It is there. In the sky, in the actions of the many who are responding to the events of this world with truth, justice, and love, and in each of us as we do our best to live out what that babe in the manger was all about. It may seem like a flickering flame now and then, but the Source of this Light will never be overcome.

I hope to see you in zoom church this Sunday. We'll reflect a bit more on this Light and on the wisdom of the wise ones from the East who, as songwriter Christopher Grundy put it in a brand new song that we'll hear in worship, "took another way Home."
